It's been quite an undertaking. From deciding that it sounded like a good idea to the journey itself has taken months of meticulous planning and research... Yeah right – this is me we're talking about.

I had done a bit of research, buying maps and beginning to think about a route. Planning where to stay (but not getting around to booking until a week before we were meant to leave). I'd found a gift aid sponsor form on the internet, but hadn't printed it off until a couple of weeks before we embarked on the adventure.

In spite of my inability to nail down plans until they became absolutely urgent things worked out (or at least I hope they did) and the journey began as planned.

You'll often hear the Christian life compared to a journey. Before Christians were called Christians they were called followers of the Way (Acts 9:2), and in a sense I think it's a shame that we've lost that. The journey is a great image for us to hold in mind as we think about the direction in which our lives are going.

It is far too easy to see being a Christian as something static - a decision we made however many years ago to say yes to Jesus, but in those intervening years maybe, as far as our faith goes, not a lot has changed. How far would you say you have travelled in your faith in these last years?



At this time following Pentecost, it is good to reflect upon the huge adventure on which those first followers were about to embark. They had been given clues, but I very much doubt that they had much of an idea of what was going to happen next.

But the book of Acts gives an insight into the willingness of those first Christians to go where Jesus sent and do what he asked. They were open to the Holy Spirit's leading and excited about the way in which God wanted to use them. Can the same be said about us?

As we move through these next months let's open our hearts again to the possibilities that are available to those who are willing followers of Jesus. It might surprise you where we end up.



### Help in Church

Each Sunday we have our Traditional Eucharist Service, don't we? There can be forty to fifty members of the congregation who attend this service on a good day. But how many members of the congregation help to make our Church and the service possible?

You may think that this is an odd question. I thought so too until one day (for want of something to do) I started doodling and added up who did what. I ended up somewhat surprised.

For the Traditional Eucharist we have those who actually take part in the service, beginning with our vicar, our organist, side persons and verger, choir, readers (Lucy, Heather and David). Then during the service we have three other readers, and then the assistant with communion. Plus the two welcomers who also do the collection, and our volunteers who take up the Elements. Also, we have those who run the Sunday School and then - most important of all - the Church Wardens and Service Wardens (although that's a matter of opinion, I suppose!).

On top of this we have the volunteers who have learned to sign for special services.

These are the people who take part in the actual service. Then we have to add those who do the tea and coffee.

our cleaner and the ladies who do the flowers each week, plus those coming in to water them. Where would we be without a clean Church. those beautiful flowers and those refreshments after the service?

If we add all of these members together we have an approximate figure of 36 volunteers per Traditional Service; and many of them do other things as well.

This figure does not include the PCC or any other groups, only the Sunday School.

#### **Our Toilet**

Toilets are often for taken granted and the butt of jokes, sometimes controversial. all and not



churches have one. We have been doing quite a bit of work to our toilet lately: replacing the water heater, adding a paper towel dispenser and including complimentary some toiletries.

Our toilet is now also twinned with a toilet in Liberia. If you haven't seen it. there is a photo on the wall. The donation we made to participate in the twinning will be used by **toilet** Tearfund to provide trom Cord and Tearfund sanitation and hygiene education.

#### So why have we done this?

Statistics vary, but there are about 3.5 million people in Liberia, approximately half of whom are Christian.

They have suffered from two civil wars and there is widespread tuberculosis, diarrhoea, malaria and, most recently, Ebola. People expect to live until about the age of 57, with nearly a quarter of under-5s malnourished. The country also has one of the highest incidents of sexual violence against women in the world.

As well as a charitable outworking of our faith, it will be great if we can develop some links with, for example, the schools and churches. Their official language is English and there will be lots we can perhaps learn, share and pray about.

Something to ponder whilst doing the necessities! **Steph** 

# *Church and State A Tale of Two Cities*

An exhibition is running at Chester Cathedral until the end of 2015 to mark the 800<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Promulgation of the Magna Carta on June 15<sup>th</sup> 1215.

Should the Church get involved in politics? Ever since Magna Carta, for better or for worse, it has been. The Church was as much a party to the Charter as the rebellious Barons, and the first freedom the Charter quaranteed was the freedom of the Church from interference by the State. How was that freedom affected when Henry VIII centuries later proclaimed himself "Supreme Head" of the Church of England - a position still held by the Queen? Is there a Christian theology of the State? Is there a Christian politics, as the recent Bishops' Pastoral Letter Who is my Neighbour? suggests? These are some of the questions the exhibition explores.
