The gospel reading for the day is very appropriate for this time when we are reflecting on the start and events of the First World War. In it, Jesus speaks about the Christian call to service.

Whoever wishes to be great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be your slave; just as the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many. Matthew 20:26-28

Now Jesus speaking here is not talking about the horrors of war. But he is talking about the giving of one's own life for good of others, the the sacrifice of self-interest. making your desires own subservient to the good of others. And over and over again in those years, that is being done what was bv people of all the services whether it was understood as such or not.

Thankfully here in Edgeley and Cheadle Heath there are of us who are touched personally



by the tragedies of war, but Jesus' call to service is equally if not even more applicable to our situation. We all know that living out the life of the Kingdom is more than our own personal devotion and church on a Sunday. How are we going to commit to a life lived for the good of others? Can we say that we are true to that life if, when some better offer comes up, we turn away and please ourselves? Are we willing to follow the Master wherever he leads and whatever it takes?

# The Diocesan Lay Conference (Part II)

The conference was a welcome opportunity to get away from normal activities, refresh and meet some really interesting people. An added bonus was the beautiful sunshine.

The weekend's theme was discipleship, and we explored what it means to be a disciple of Jesus today. A full-time practical apprenticeship, so not just for Sundays and Bible study. We thought about the challenges of serving wherever God has placed us in the world; and whoever He has placed us with: family, friends and colleagues.

We developed these ideas further in workshops, and at one we discussed daily ethical dilemmas, drawing on personal experiences ranging from workplace bullying through fraud to suicide.

For me, the most memorable moment was walking on the shores of Hayes Lake early on Sunday morning, singing *Breathe* on me Breath of God, bathed in early morning light and accompanied with bird song.

#### A Welcome Visitor

These words are from David Sykes. a descendent of the Svkes familv who donated land and money to help build all three of the churches in our parish.

He loved his visit and was pleased that the guides to our churches are on the website, so he

can read them at his leisure.

I had come primarily to see the memorial window to Richard Sykes, my areat-areat grandfather, but I had no idea until [my visit] about how involved the Sykes family had been in helping to set up new churches around Edgeley in the past. Perhaps it should not have been a surprise to me that the family was so committed to the church, as my great-grandfather William (Richard's second son, and one of his eleven children) was ordained instead of working family's bleaching in the business, which is what most of his brothers did. Born at Edgeley,

William did not stay in the area, but had a notable career as a

> military chaplain instead: starting off in the Crimean War working alongside Florence Nightingale at Scutari - and ending up as 'Honorary Military Chaplain' to Queen Victoria.

> This was my first visit to Edgeley, and I learned so much in just a couple of hours – not only in the church, but

from the excellent information boards in the park as well. It was fascinating to see where the factory used to be, and the way that the old reservoirs have been incorporated into the park. The spire of St Matthew's is certainly a notable landmark - it's a fine church. Best of all it was good to hear how lively the church still is, with so many programmes and activities, and such an active role in the community. I'm sure Richard Sykes and all the other parishioners who founded the church back in 1858 would be delighted to see how it continues to thrive!
